Love your neighbour as being yourself

The 4th-century theologian Jerome tells a story about the Apostle John. John was old and frail, unable to walk, so his disciples would carry him into the gathering of believers on the Lord's Day. Every week these were his words to the congregation: "Little children, love one another." This went on week after week, until at last, more than a little weary of these repeated words, his disciples asked him, "Master, why do you always say this?" "Because," John replied, "it is the Lord's command, and if this only is done, it is enough." [1]

The teaching of Jesus, to love God and our neighbour as ourself, appears in the Gospels eight times. This should help us realise the significance of this teaching but I wonder how many of us, when reading today's gospel, inwardly said, "I know this. I have the T-shirt." We skim-read the words. Or, if we do stay with them for a short while, we may reflect on traditional interpretations :

- Love God and love others. You can't have one without the other.
- Love your neighbour as yourself. "Do to others what you would have them do to you," or "Love your neighbour as much as yourself."

'If we listen closely to Jesus however, there is no 'as much as' in his admonition. It is "Love your neighbour as yourself." Or 'Love your neighbour as being yourself—as a continuation of your very own being. It's a complete seeing that your neighbour is you. There are not two individuals out there; there are simply two cells of the one great Life.' [2]

'Neuroscience can demonstrate that when a loving or positive thought comes our way, we have to savour it consciously for at least fifteen seconds before it can imprint itself in our "implicit memory;" otherwise it doesn't stick. We must indeed savour the good in order to significantly change our way of seeing and being.' [3] "Love your neighbour as being yourself."

Valarie Kaur, an American lawyer, educator and faith leader, invites us to look upon the face of anyone and say: "You are a part of me I do not yet know. I will listen to your story. Stories can see no stranger." [4]

'Our Gospel story ends in stunned silence. Silence is the appropriate first response to the radical love we're called to. We dare not speak of it glibly. We dare not cheapen it with shallow sentiment or piety. Rather, let's ask for the grace to receive it as the wise scribe received it: in awed and grateful silence.' [5] Then, when we are ready, 'let's acknowledge God's presence within us and reach out and affirm God's presence in the other.' [3]
